 - A: Lake Ontario and Lake Erie

 - A: Great Barrington, Massachusetts (1886)
- 53. Q: What city ranks as the largest seaport (measured by tonnage) in New England?
 - A: Portland, Maine

 - A: The Thomas Clark House
- 55. Q: What is the name of the man who has been credited with the incorporation of Belmont?

 - A: Cushing Square, Waverly Square, and Belmont Center
- 57. Q: About how high is the highest point in Belmont?
 - A: about 300 feet

- 59. Q: What road forms part of the boundary between Watertown and Belmont?
 - A: Belmont Street


