

Watershed Stewards

The Winn Brook School was recently awarded a major grant from the Foundation for Belmont Education. We are very excited and appreciative that, thanks to the Foundation, we have the opportunity to help preserve a species of turtle that is threatened in Massachusetts. Dr. Bryan Windmiller, a local scientist, has been working with the Mass. Division of Fisheries and Wildlife as well as Mass. Audubon Society in order to protect the Blandings Turtle, which is currently listed as Threatened or Endangered in all of its natural habitats except those in New Hampshire.

Second and third graders will have the primary responsibility for the turtles' care since they are learning about their community, animal adaptation and habitats. Classrooms at other grade levels will also have opportunities to observe the turtles and follow the hatchlings' progress. Second and third graders will provide the school community with periodic updates and growth data will be recorded on a bulletin board outside of the office for all to see.

Blandings Turtles are threatened for a number of reasons. In addition to habitat destruction, the eggs are often destroyed by birds, cats, and other animals, including the fisher cats that have moved into this area. Older turtles are most commonly killed by traffic since they frequently travel to new wetland sights or cross roads in search of nesting grounds. The female Blandings are not able to reproduce until the age of 14-20 years; therefore, many never survive long-enough to produce offspring.

Dr. Windmiller protects the turtle nests with wire cages until the hatchlings emerge. He then delivers them to several institutions throughout the Boston area to be nurtured throughout the winter months. In late spring, when they are large enough to survive in the wild, the turtles are tagged and returned to their natural habitat. Surprisingly, Dr. Windmiller has documented increased survival rates with school-raised turtles which fare better than those raised in large aquariums. He attributes this to the frequency with which students observe the

turtles. Frequent monitoring allows health problems to be detected early and addressed.

The children will soon be voting on gender-neutral names for Turtle 108 and 124. The sex of the turtles was dependent on the temperature of their nests. We cannot identify their sex until they are transported to the Franklin Park Zoo in February. During that visit, they will undergo a laparoscopic procedure which will allow scientists to determine their gender. This high-tech look inside the turtles will be recorded and shared with us as a U-Tube video.

For several years, we have promoted our core values (respect, community and high expectations) by focusing attention on environmental issues, particularly the need to demonstrate respect for our resources by reusing and recycling them. The Turtle Project will also promote respect and help students understand the importance of preserving not only material resources, but threatened wildlife as well. Additionally, it will allow students to make a significant and authentic contribution to their community.

We thank Ximena Soto Landry for helping to bring this project to fruition through her hard work on our grant application.

Vacation Planning


Please plan your vacations so that

Current teaching techniques are often multisensory and cooperative learning strategies are used which involve children working in small group settings. It is virtually impossible for a teacher to reconstruct the learning experiences that were missed due to a vacation. Not only is your child put at a disadvantage if he/ she misses school, but time and attention is taken away from the class as a whole when a child is unprepared to progress with a sequence of activities due to a vacation absence. Please consider whether or not you want to convey a message to your child that leads him/her to believe that skipping school is acceptable.

A Note from our Nurse

All families with students in grades 1,4,7, and 10 will receive a report of their child's Body Mass Index or BMI. This state mandate, conducted by the School Nurse, is part of a state-wide effort to promote better health for all. Measuring heights and weights has been part of the health screening conducted in schools for decades; however, this is the first year that reports will be sent home.

Winter Weather Reminders

Given our recent weather, it is a good time to review our winter recess procedures and recommendation for dress. Since the children benefit from fresh air and active play, we send them outside for recess unless the weather is particularly wet or drastically cold. -As you are probably aware, a layered approach is generally the best way to cope with winter conditions. The layers help conserve body heat while children are outside and enable students to adjust to interior temperatures that may vary as they travel to the gym, lunch, and specialists' classrooms.

Students will only be allowed to play in the snow if they are wearing the appropriate gear (snow pants, boots, hats and mittens/gloves.)
